JESS DEACON & BAND



FROM THE PRESIDENT

We publicised Neil Billington as a virtuoso on harmonica, and he certainly delivered on that promise. Together with his five-piece band, Neil played a diverse – and fascinating – selection of jazz and blues. The numbers traversed jazz standards (Georgia on my Mind, Stardust, Comes Love), Latin numbers (including a wonderful Oye Como Va written by Tito Puente and made famous by Santana), Chicago blues standards (including Elmore James's The Sky is Crying), country blues (e.g. Sonny Boy Williamson's Your Funeral and My Trial) and some rock 'n roll (a great variant of Little Richard's Lucille). One interesting choice was Gary Moore's Still Got the Blues. It's a song that I have heard countless times, but I only learned at the gig that the song is written using the chords of Errol Garner's Autumn Leaves.

Not only was the selection diverse, but so too were Neil's harmonicas and harmonica styles. He used the standard 10-hole blues harp on most of the blues and rockier numbers, then switched to chromatic harmonica – regarded as one of the most difficult instruments to play – for most of the jazz standards. For those who haven't come across one, the chromatic harmonica has a slide that switches the instrument from a standard C major scale to a C# major scale, meaning that the sharps and flats have to be played by pressing in the slide. When playing at speed, as Neil did on many numbers, his slide had to work overtime! He even varied his chromatic harmonica styles, playing in styles pioneered by Larry Adler, then Toots Thielemans (perhaps the most famous of all chromatic harmonica players) and then playing octaves in the style of the Argentinian harmonica player, Hugo Diaz. Most players can master only one of these styles; Neil was a virtuoso in them all!

The band was also superb (though some audience members found the balance to be not quite right). Duncan Haynes played very tuneful and understated keyboards, Patrick Bleakley showed his usual musicality on bass, Nick Granville showed his

versatility with some fiery guitar work while Darren Mathiassen on drums was so energetic that Neil asked at one point "what are you on?!" The ability of the band to adjust to the varied musical styles was a tribute to them all.

As if that wasn't enough, Cindy Muggeridge (on keyboards and vocals) joined Neil for a couple of beautiful duets. Neil also performed a duet with Duncan Haynes on keyboards, then performed a solo Sonny Boy Williamson number on harmonica and vocals. (Incidentally, Sonny Boy Williamson was a huge influence on the early-1960s British blues bloom playing with people such as a very young Eric Clapton, and heavily influencing John Mayall's harmonica style).

To cap it off, the band played an encore in response to overwhelming demand, based on a track by Stevie Wonder (himself one of the world's greatest chromatic harmonica players) ending with a stunning "train" rendition. It was a night for the full house to remember.

Our August gig features Jess Deacon, a superb vocalist who performed a handful of numbers in Geoff Culverwell's gig last year. We were so impressed with her singing on that occasion that we invited her back to headline a show. We provide further details about her gig later in this newsletter.
